In preparation for the reunion, I would like to get one photo for each Turrentine ancestor couple (or two photos to have side by side) and a story that either tells about how he/she preserved or reveals his/her personality. I would like these photos and stories, even if you cannot attend. The plan is to put them on a DVD/CD along with the list of descendants that will serve as the 5<sup>th</sup> edition of <u>The Turrentine Family</u>.

## **DNA Update**

We now have at least 22 Turrentine cousins who have tested at FTDNA or uploaded their atDNA results from another site to FTDNA. Additional cousins have tested at Ancestry.com and 23 & me. I am compiling a spread sheet of the matches. I am not including matches to siblings, aunts, uncles, first cousins, as they share a lot of atDNA from the non-Turrentine ancestors. The idea is to find pieces of atDNA that are probably inherited from an early Turrentine ancestor couple. One match appears to be back to the common ancestors of the brothers Samuel and Alexander. It is a 7<sup>th</sup> cousin relationship. Most are 3<sup>rd</sup> to 5<sup>th</sup> cousin relationships. I have identified 3 Turrentines who match descendants of Tabitha Turrentine who married Thomas Goolsby in about 1707 in Virginia, before

Samuel and Alexander came to Philadelphia. Of course, there could be another connection between these matches and their Turrentine cousins, but so far we have not found it. We also have 2 matches to people who are not sure how their Turrentines fit into the family of Samuel and Alexander. We are hoping that by using the cousins they do match, we can find where they fit in the family tree.

I was recently asked, "How many Turrentine descendants are there?" I have no idea. If we could contact them all it would be tens of thousands. Many are descendants of a Turrentine daughter several generations back and have no idea they have a Turrentine ancestor. I do know that for the prior letter, I sent out 45 paper copies and 276 electronic copies, but that is the number of families, not the number of people. I know some people print and share the letter with additional relatives who do not like to read the newsletter on the computer. Because I only mail out the 'Turrentine Letter' a few time a year, it does not make people's list of address changes and I get a few returns every time. Another important page at the site is the Cynthia Keyton Scholarship application. The criteria to be studying to be a minister, teacher, nurse or in the music field has been dropped. The applicant must be an undergraduate at an accredited college, university or junior college. Application can be made at any point after admission, but payment will not be issued until successful completion of the quarter/semester with passing grades. For attendance in the year 2017, the application must be received by January 1, 2018. The grade report can be submitted after selection and does not have to be submitted with the initial application. She was a native of Person County and a member of New Hope Person Baptist Church in Timberlake. ## **Newspapers.com - "old" Turrentine News**

We found "Tink" Turrentine whose house was struck by lightening. Tink's given name was Louis (or sometimes Lewis). He was an African-American born about 1867 in Rover, Bedford County, Tennessee. His father was James Turrentine and his mother was Elizabeth or Betsy. The 1870 census for Shelbyville post office states that the father, James, could read and write, did not yet own land, but had a personal estate of \$500. A descendant says there is a Turrentine farm in the area that is still in the family, although she is not sure if it includes the home that was struck by lightening in 1927. The buildings on the farm are in need of repair and restoration.

I have previously reported that Gail Mueller Whitman #4076 of Ft. Collins, Colorado was a book illustrator. She illustrated "The Man From Space". I have found an article about another book illustrator, Barbara Bailey Turrentine, of Irving, Texas. Barbara was the wife of Charles F. Turrentine #2513. In 1972, she illustrated an "Autumn Road", a book written by her mother, Winifred Thorn Bailey.

Be advised there are often quite a few people with the same name. The criteria is a Turrentine descendant or married to a Turrentine descendant. I like to post name, dates or at least years of birth and death (when it applies) and Turrentine connection - name of spouse or Turrentine ancestor or the T# number if listed in The Turrentine Family 3<sup>rd</sup> or 4<sup>th</sup> edition.
