Orange Glen High's football team had plenty of reasons to be thankful last week. Not only did they beat longtime rival Valley Center High 42-38 on Nov. 2, the win gave the Patriots their first home playoff game in 15 years. Savoring the victory among themselves isn't the team's style, and coaches decided that the time was right for senior players to honor teachers or staff members who've inspired or challenged them. At a noontime rally Friday, about two dozen players gave teachers or staff members their away-game jerseys to wear to last night's playoff game against Chula Vista's Hilltop High. Senior wide receiver Austin Cosler chose English teacher Christine Turrentine to wear his jersey "because for the three years I've been here, she's been like a mom to me." "She's been here (for me) no matter what," said Austin, 16. "She's always helped me, no matter what class. And I just really appreciated it. ... It's just something small to give back. (Teachers) put so much time and effort

into us.” Turrentine was thrilled to be chosen. “It’s really a very high compliment ... (and) one of those warm fuzzy things.” Turrentine said she rarely misses a football games, and, as a teacher, “having contact with kids outside the classroom lets them know I care more about them than just their grades.”

For the first time since 2009, the Danville Hawks opened the football season with a victory as they defeated Randolph High School by a score of 21-7 last Thursday night at Smith-Owens Stadium in Danville. One of the key plays was an interception by Danville defensive back Travis Turrentine which set up the Hawks next touchdown drive. Turrentine picked off a fourth-and-seven pass and returned it 19 yards to give Danville a first and 10 at the Hawk 40.
